Welcome to the July edition of Roughies Reflections

Dear Gabriel,

Past the half-way point of the year! End of financial year can be both stressful and exhilarating. I have to confess that I do love the excitement of raising money for a cause I love. Our Winter Appeal was a terrific experience. I feel grateful for the goodwill and generosity of our donors who helped us get to the wonderful result of a little over \$70,000 by 30 June. Thank you so much!

With all the uncertainty in our community about rising Covid cases, it is yet to have a negative impact on patrons coming to Rough Edges. By the end of June, the number of meals we are serving continues to rise. We are also likely to have more referrals to our Banksia Women program than last year. We share some stories from Jenny our Case Manager further on. I hope that, as you read these, you can see the very practical help we are providing women in very difficult circumstances.

Reflecting on a recent conversation I had at Rough Edges with one of our patrons, I couldn't help thinking about the crazy turns our lives can take. He was someone I hadn't seen previously, but we connected pretty easily. He told me about the difficulty of living in temporary accommodation while he waits for a permanent place through social housing. His present situation is not great. He talked about the frustration of not knowing when he will be able to move out of his limbo state. Yet, there wasn't a note of bitterness or entitlement in his tone.

I learned that he had lost work a couple of years earlier due to the knock-on effects of Covid. He also spoke about struggles with mental health. In a relatively short space of time, this articulate, friendly and gentle man was effectively without a permanent home. His life had turned on 20 cent piece. Being a place of welcome, where a stranger could listen to his story was the setting he stepped into that night at Rough Edges. I told him that I wished I could do more. I still do. That wish is taking hold of me and I hope it doesn't let me go.

Thank you for allowing us to provide a place of welcome and for offering practical help where we can.

Very soon I'll be writing to you about our plans for Roughtober. Save the date for **21** or **28 October**. More to come.



Because of their experience of trauma, things that might seem simple, like applying for affordable housing or Legal Aid, become insurmountable tasks for people who've left domestic violence situations.

An Urban Walk

A lesser known impact of the lockdowns on our services has been the number of Urban Exposure tours we have had to cancel. This year we have provided over 50 walks, with another 43 booked in. Most of these are for school groups, but we also provide walks for corporate groups and other community groups.





The tours are led by people with a lived experience of homelessness, who share their story while offering a unique persepective of life in Darlinghurst/Kings Cross. Each brings their personal experience to their tour, and will touch on areas of drug addiction, HIV, mental health, trauma and recovery. It is an eye opening experience which gives insight into the lives of real people, promoting empathy and understanding.

Our walks cost \$495 (including GST) and can be booked for groups of up to 20 (and we can provide up to four walks concurrently). If you are interested in bringing a group along, please email naomi.escott@stjohnsanglican.org.au
