
Ken and Dea Richardson: A Whirlwind Romance

Ken organised for then-Rector Reverend Victor Roberts to renew their vows at St Mark's on their anniversary. The three congregated at the church on a Wednesday evening, reminiscent of their wedding. Ken and Dea privately renewed their vows again two years ago at St Mark's.

Christianity is a key aspect of Ken and Dea's lives. Dea grew up attending church and was part of the parish's choir. Ken attended church intermittently throughout his childhood, but he feels Christianity has been omnipresent in his daily life.

Ken believes that God has always cared for him and been a source of guidance. Despite experiencing difficulties from time to time, Ken explains that things generally fall into place: God is supporting him and his family.

Ken's career took the couple and their children to Melbourne in 1974. Ken was confirmed while they lived there. His confirmation was another surprise to Dea. She explains that she was deeply moved by his personal decision to be confirmed. She knew it was extremely important to him.

The couple's immense love for each other and mutual values has kept their relationship strong for over 58 years. They have experienced life's usual highs and lows, but overall, they cannot imagine live without each other and their faith, explains Dea.
